

A few words from the president

I hope you had a nice Thanksgiving and you're poised for an equally good holiday season. With that notable snowfall on November 21, I thought the season for botanizing might become limited to appreciating twigs, bark and evergreen leaves. The following warm up melted off all the snow, though, and gave us at least another few days where we could enjoy what's remaining of this past year's herbaceous plants.

My favorite plant to search for this time of year is sensitive fern (Onoclea sensibilis), and I did just that last weekend while I was home visiting family in Lake Bluff. I made a pilgrimage to the site where I first cut buckthorn and honeysuckle, and I was first introduced to sensitive fern in the wetland that surrounds it. I swapped out my leather boots for some rubber knee boots and went on the hunt

Sensitive fern is so named because the sterile fronds of the plant are so sensitive to frost that they shrivel up with the first frost of the fall. What remains standing well beyond that first frost (and often into the following growing season) is the fertile frond, which is a beautiful structure that resembles an ornate fiddlehead (see the included photos of the green sterile fronds taken during the growing season, and the brown fertile fronds taken last weekend). To my delight, I came across a number of these beauties on my search and I was glad to see the population doing so well. I'm looking forward to revisiting the site during the growing season where it will likely be a lush, green bed of sensitive fern, with lots of bluejoint (Calamagrostis canadensis), and the occasional monkeyflower (Mimulus ringens) and blue flag iris (Iris virginica var. shrevei).

I hope you can get out and find some of your favorite plants this time of year, too! Check out the upcoming events section in this newsletter for some ideas on how you might enjoy the outdoors, or at least appreciate them from the comfort of the indoors. While the Northeast Chapter hasn't organized a December event yet, we'll be sure to let you know if and when we get our act together and will share the event details as they become available. - Andy
