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A few words from the president

Hi Northeast Chapter!

I hope March is treating you well so far. This morning I noticed that daffodils are starting to poke out of the ground outside my apartment here in Urbana and I heard some calls from red-winged blackbirds and a cardinal, too. I'm betting that the Chicago region isn't far off from these signs of spring, if you haven't observed them already- I have seen photos that show Chicago area skunk cabbage (*Symplocarpus foetidus*) is already on its way up! Check out the attached photos of one of my favorite patches of skunk cabbage from a few years back, this one at Grunwald Farms Forest Preserve in Elburn (Kane County).





In addition to those natural signs of spring, I'm always made aware of this season by the numerous seasonal job announcements posted for positions working in natural resources. Instead of talking at length about how fortunate we are to have so many opportunities for employment in our field in the Chicago region (which I tend to do often) I'd like to highlight a current opening for a job I had a while back that went a long way toward exposing me to the plants of Illinois.

In the summer before I graduated from college, I worked as a field assistant to professional botanists of the Critical Trends Assessment Program of the Illinois Natural History Survey. We traveled throughout the state from May through August and conducted plant surveys (identifying plants to species and quantifying their abundance) in forests, wetlands and grasslands. I learned a ton of new plants, got to travel all over Illinois for the first time, and was able to add items to my resume that I know helped me get each of my jobs thereafter. I'd highly recommend it as great summer job for anyone that likes plants, traveling, and field work. Champaign-Urbana is a nice place to spend a summer and it's pretty easy to find a place to sublet. One last sign that spring is almost here is that we're offering our first field trip of the season, a winter tree identification workshop and hike. We're calling it a winter tree ID hike because we'll focus on teaching some twig, bud, and bark features that can help folks identify trees to species without the help of leaves. Illinois Exotic Weed Act

Effective 1 February 2016, it is illegal (except by permit) to buy, sell or distribute plants identified on an updated listed of exotic weeds.

Japanese honeysuckle (*Lonicera japonica*), multiflora rose (*Rosa multiflora*), purple loosestrife (*Lythrum salicaria*), common buckthorn (*Rhamnus cathartica*), glossy buckthorn (*Rhamnus frangula*), saw-toothed buckthorn (*Rhamnus arguta*), dahurian buckthorn (*Rhamnus davurica*), Japanese buckthorn (*Rhamnus japonica*), Chinese buckthorn (*Rhamnus utilis*), kudzu (*Pueraria lobata*), exotic bush honeysuckles (*Lonicera*

maackii, Lonicera tatarica, Lonicera morrowii, and Lonicera fragrantissima), exotic olives (Elaeagnus umbellata, Elaeagnus pungens, Elaeagnus angustifolia), salt cedar (all members of the Tamarix genus), poison hemlock (Conium maculatum), giant hogweed (Heracleum mantegazzianum), Oriental bittersweet (Celastrus orbiculatus), and lesser celandine (Ficaria verna), teasel (all members of the Dipsacus genus), and Japanese, giant, and Bohemian knotweed (Fallopia japonica, syn. Polygonum cuspidatum; Fallopia sachalinensis; and Fallopia x bohemica).
