

What Happened to Liliaceae?
Reasons for Taxonomic Changes
Tuesday, January 15th at 6:30 p.m.
Carbondale Township Hall, 217 E. Main St.

Presented by plant biology expert, Marisa Szubryt, this talk will cover the historical difficulty classifying the lily family, Liliaceae, and how it has changed since the eighteenth century.



Numerous Liliaceae species grow natively or have been introduced to Illinois. Come found out what a true biological lily is & just how much Liliaceae has changed since Linnaeus' time! This program is free and open to gapanthus, Amaryllidaceae the public.

The lake at my residence also froze solid and my wife and I were able to ice skate on it this week, which was a real treat. I wonder how many more years it will be before we are able to do that again.



We have another year of programming about wrapped up and are excited about the offerings. Our monthly programs are generally held on the 3rd Tuesday of the month and we meet at the Carbondale Township Hall. Dinner with the speaker begins at 5:00PM and the presentations start at 6:30PM. Workshops, field trips, and the annual Indigenous Plants Symposium are generally held on weekends. Speaking of the Symposium, the date has been changed to April 13-15 in order to accommodate our speakers' availability.

Our next program will feature board member, Marisa Szubryt, who will speak about the fragmentation of the Lily family. In Illinois, the only native genera that remain in the Liliaceae are Clintonia, Erythronium, and Lilium. Learn about why this once large family has been broken up.

In February, I invite INPS members to join me and my wife at out residence in Makanda for a potluck and "cadaver botany" hike. This term is used to describe the act of looking at plants in the dormant season. We will provide a lunch of hearty chicken soup and ask guests to bring a side dish. After lunch, we will walk in the adjacent woods looking at the above ground remains of last year's perennial plant growth, as well as tree characteristics, and bryophytes like moss. Feature Plant of the Month Putty Root Orchid,

Aplectrum hyemale

This species is also referred to as the Adam and Eve orchid. While it may seem strange for the leaves to exist this time of year, it's because this orchid photosynthesizes in the winter. The emergence of the leaf coincides with the late fall and winter months when more light reaches the forest floor because the deciduous trees have lost their leaves. They are able to photosynthesize at temperatures as low as 35 degrees! It is easily missed when blooming (late spring into summer) due to the inconspicuously colored flowers in hues of olive green and burgundy. The bulb-like corms exude a sticky, mucus like substance that were used to repair pottery and crockery, giving way to the orchid's name. The natural range of this species is similar to the Cranefly Orchid; similar appearances can make identification confusing. Look for it in moist woodlands, above streams, bottom of slopes, and damp depressions.


Cape Girardeau Nature Center

Backyard Maple Syrup Production Workshop February 3rd, 2018 10:00am


The third annual backyard maple syrup production workshop will be held on Saturday, February 3, 2018 from 10am-noon at the Dixon Springs Agricultural Center, located at 354 State Highway 145 N, Simpson, IL 62985. This program is free and open to the public.

Chris Evans, University of Illinois Extension Forester, will cover tree identification, equipment needs, tree tapping, sap collection, boiling, and finishing maple syrup. Participants will see firsthand the processes involved in making maple syrup. We will have a demonstration of a syrup evaporator and an optional tour of a sugarbush forest, managed for maple syrup production and utilizing a pipeline system of sap collection.

The University of Illinois Extension will provide some activities for kids, including taste testing of real maple syrup!
