# Sedge Identification Workshop part II



Last weekend was part two of our series of workshops focused on sedges. Sedges are grass-like plants in the Cyperaceae family, yet they are more closely related to rushes than grasses. This family contains many species that are difficult to identify. Sedges are underappreciated and often overlooked yet one in every five species of plants in Illinois is in this family. While the last workshop focused on the largest genus in this family (Carex), this workshop focused on the many other genera of plants in this diverse family such as Cyperus, Eleocharis, Rhynchospora, and Scirpus.

The workshop proved to be a very humbling experience for the professional and amateur botanists in attendance. We learned that not all species of



sedges have edges (triangular stems) although general characteristics include having tristichous leaves and floral scales that are distichous or spiraled. Sedges can be distinguished from grasses (*Poaceae*) by the closed sheath

margins on the leaves and they can be distinguished from rushes (Juncaceae) by the presence of achenes instead of capsules. Special thanks to Dr. Gordon Tucker of Eastern Illinois University for leading the workshop.







The sedge identification workshop was organized by the southern chapter of the Illinois Native Plant Society and made possible by the Department of Plant Biology at Southern Illinois University in Carbondale and a grant from the Illinois Wildlife Preservation Fund.

### **Moss Sex Driven by Scent**

During mating season, a moss needs a little help from its friends—and it uses smell to recruit them. A new study has found that mosses, which were long thought to require only water or wind to reproduce, release an aroma that entices tiny animals such as mites and little bugs called springtails to help fertilize the plants. # **INPS AUGUST PROGRAM**

## The Sedge ID Workshop was the only event scheduled for August. Please look for our next event in the September newsletter.

Ever fancied naming a plant after yourself? Or perhaps you'd prefer to immortalize a beloved pet? Well, either way, now's your chance.

The naming rights for this newly discovered iris from the genus *Hesperantha* are up for grabs in an online auction. Proceeds will go to charities that aim to protect its critically endangered habitat in the Overberg region of South Africa.

The plant flowers late in the year, at the beginning of the dry season, when the vegetation surrounding it is dry and brown. Even its own leaves are more or less dry when it flowers - the only signs of life are the iris's buds and bright pink flower. It blooms early in the morning, closing its petals again by early afternoon, perhaps to avoid the harsh sun or unwanted insect visitors. Read more at...

## Another rare plant located in flower in southern Illinois!

This plant is rare in southern Illinois and the flowers only open for a short time in the late afternoon making them difficult to photograph. For these reasons, the state threatened *Talinum parviflorum*, or Small Flower-of-an-hour, is a real find. Also called Fameflower or Rock Pink, this tiny species of plant occurs in Illinois at only a few sites mostly in central Johnson County.

The genus *Talinum* (now called *Phemeranthus*) contains three species in Illinois although none of them are common. In the *Portulacaceae* family, *Talinum parviflorum* is a small succulent plant that prefers dry and rocky habitats. The largest population can be found on a sandstone glade on the south side of Round Bluff Nature Preserve at Ferne Clyffe State Park.

Interestingly, the illinoiswildflowers.com website says the flowers of this species open on sunny days in the morning and Don Kurz's Illinois Wildflowers book says this species flowers in the mid-afternoon. Yet on multiple days in August this species was found at 6:00pm with flowers just opening up and was in full glorious bloom by 7:00pm. Clearly the plants are not reading the literature!

"Geologic Jewels" Protected in Randolph County

One of Illinois' geologic jewels, with canyons, gorges and sandstone cliffs, will now be protected in perpetuity under a recent deal by Clifftop and HeartLands Conservancy. The two nonprofit land trusts worked jointly to purchase a unique tract of land in Randolph County. "Illinois residents usually think such natural features are unique to the Southwestern U.S. But,

Southwestern Illinois also hosts these geologic jewels and our organizations are excited to protect and conserve this property," said George Obernagel, President of Clifftop's Board of Directors. The 115-acre parcel of land contains sandstone canyons and gorges and cliff systems that host unusual plant communities. A significant stretch of Mill Creek also winds through the property The newly named "Mill Creek Natural Area" hosts plant species now found much further north. These rare glacial relict communities demonstrate the power of ancient geologic forces as the canyons



have sheltered plants such as club moss, cinnamon fern, and bishop's cap for eons.

HeartLands and Clifftop worked together in 2010 to purchase, jointly own, and permanently protect the 475-acre White Rock property in Monroe County. The Grand Victoria Foundation and private donors in Southwestern Illinois provided funding for the Mill Creek acquisition.

The organizations will conduct a number of special guided field trips to Mill Creek Natural Area, but the site will not be open to the general public in the near future. The organizations are planning restoration and stewardship work for the benefit of the property and the unique ecological communities sheltered there.
